LAND ACKNOWLEDGEMENT

With gratitude, we begin by acknowledging that the land we are on is the traditional territory of many First Nations including the Mississauga's of the Credit, the Anishnabeg, the Chippewa, the Haudenosaunee, and the Wendat peoples, and is now home to many diverse First Nations, Inuit and Métis peoples. We are their guests and need to be better guests in solidarity with their struggles and the ongoing injustices they suffer. First Nation's history of the residential school system, cultural genocide, and the Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls give rise to similar health issues which we at CCVT deal with regarding the impact of genocide, torture, and rape as an instrument of war and human and sex trafficking. CCVT stands in solidarity with indigenous people and communities and we have much to learn from their lived experiences. I would also like to acknowledge that we are all treaty peoples - including those of us who came here as settlers - as migrants either in this generation or in generations past; and those of us who came here involuntarily as refugees and as a result of the Trans-Atlantic Slave Trade. We honour the original intent of Two Row Wampum and are committed to fostering respectful relations with Indigenous communities as we pursue the Truth and Reconciliation efforts.






SUNBAL MOHAMMAD COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT/ CHILD AND YOUTH PROGRAM MANAGER

Olivia Chow is the 66th Mayor of Toronto, the first person of Asian descent to serve as Mayor, and the first woman since the six municipalities of Metro Toronto were amalgamated into one in 1998. Born in Hong Kong in 1957, Mayor Olivia Chow immigrated to Toronto with her parents at the age of 13, where they moved to an apartment in the St. James Town neighborhood. Her parents faced the challenges of so many immigrants who have come here to build a new life for their children and make an impact on our city. And then in 2023, Olivia Chow opened a new chapter in her extraordinary life story when she ran for and won election as Mayor of Toronto, pledging to build a more affordable, safe and caring city where everyone belongs.

Sisay Wodlemichael, a former refugee who arrived in Canada in 1986, boasts an impressive academic and professional background. With a Master of Laws (LLM) in Constitutional Law from Osgoode Hall Law School, York University, and a Master of Arts (MA) in Leadership from the University of Guelph, Sisay has acquired extensive knowledge in his field. He dedicated 17 years to the Toronto Police Service, honing his expertise in law enforcement. Recognizing his exemplary skills and experience, Sisay was appointed to the Ontario Court of Justice, where he effectively serves as a Local Administrative Justice of the Peace and presides over criminal and provincial cases with utmost professionalism and diligence Additionally, he has been working with Alliance for victims of Genocide organization for the last two year and working with Toronto housing crisis group as an advocate for affordable housing for the last one year. usually created to communicate a message to a wide variety of audiences.


AUCTIONEER

2023 TREVOR BARTRAM AWARD



Trevor Bartram was a founding member of CCVT and remained an integral part of its life throughout the years. As a founding member and legal advisor, Trevor undertook the tedious and unglamorous tasks that a development organization requires. He wrote (and rewrote) the agency's bylaws, and negotiated leases, contracts, and other related agreements. He served as the secretary, Chair of the International Committee, and as a member of the Fundraising Committee. He was a jack of all trades. Over the years, Trevor contributed much to the organization befriended newcomers, and invited his many new friends into his active social life. He traveled to Africa, Latin America, and Europe attending international conferences on behalf of CCVT. The Trevor Bartram Award is given to individuals who have made a significant achievement in organizational development, particularly in setting up new community-based organizations consistent with the human rights mandate of CCVT, as well as having experience in developing programs, policies, and structures, and success with funding initiatives.

2023 Amina Malko Award



Amina Malko was one of the first CCVT staff members and worked as Office Manager for over five years. She was an extremely hardworking, tireless and committed staff member. Her particular interest was improving the lives of refugee women through her dedication and perseverance. She advocated on behalf of women refugees, working for policy changes at the local, national, and international level, and was a key member in organizing Refugee Rights Day. With CCVT funding and support, Amina undertook organizing an "African Women in the Community" conference in an effort to have women's voices expressed directly. After CCVT, Amina moved to OCASI. The Amina Malko Award is awarded to those who have significant involvement in policy, advocacy, and settlement services for newcomers.

JENNIFER STONE Neighbourhood Legal Services

Jennie Stone is the Executive Director of Neighbourhood Legal Services. She was NLS' staff immigration lawyer from 2011-2018. Prior to joining NLS she co-founded the Hong Kong Refugee Advice Centre (now Justice Centre HK) which advocates for the rights of refugee claimants and other migrants in the HKSAR. Until November 2018 she spent 4 years on the Executive Committee of the Canadian Council for Refugees. She is currently the co-chair of the CCR's Legal Affairs Committee.

2023 Francisco rico award



Francisco Rico-Martinez worked all his life for justice for more than three decades. He was President of the Canadian Council for Refugees from 1997 to 2001, as well as filling numerous other positions in the organization through the years – and never stopped being a leader, a teacher, an inspiration, a model, and a companion along the way, within the CCR and throughout the refugee and immigration advocacy communities.

The Canadian Centre for Victims of Torture establishes the Francisco Rico Martinez Award in honor of Francisco Rico-Martínez, a dedicated advocate for refugees and marginalized populations. This prestigious award recognizes two deserving students in a relevant post-secondary institution, with each recipient receiving a \$2500 prize. Francisco's legacy as a refugee and founder of the FCJ Refugee Centre inspires this award, aiming to empower future leaders in this field. The selection committee, comprising representatives from CCVT evaluated applicants based on academic achievement, commitment to social justice, and potential impact. 2023 Francisco Rico Award Recipient



OSMAN ALI

Osman Ali is a refugee who fled genocide in Darfur and lived in Israel for the last ten years. Growing up in Sudan, obtaining education was always difficult with many obstacles but he persevered. Despite all the difficulties and challenges, he never lost faith in the power of education. He now holds a Bachelor of Arts Degree in Communications and Interactive Design from Reichman University in Israel. He was able to finish the degree under pressure and threat of deportation due to lack of legal status. He is an activist and passionate refugee who fought for human rights, immigrant workers' rights and refugee rights with resilience for the last ten years in Israel.

Currently, he is residing here in Toronto Canada. Osman is pursuing a graduate degree in Immigration and Resettlement Studies at TMU. He believes that pursuing education will empower and enable him to realize his dream of contributing in the field of human rights and refugees who are struggling to survive.



FABIOLA CRUZ LI

2023 FRANCISCO RICO AWARD RECIPIENT

Fabiola Cruz Li graduated with an Honours Bachelor of Arts (HBA) from the University of Toronto in June 2023 where she pursued a Major in Latin American Studies and a Double Minor in History and Political Science. Fabiola is currently a non-degree student at the University of Toronto. As a refugee claimant higher education often seemed out of reach to her. Fabiola is committed to show asylum seekers and refugees that these spaces are accessible, and that they have agency. Fabiola has devoted herself to the cause of refugees through her extra-curricular work. As Co-Director of World University Service of Canada (WUSC), she has mentored refugee students in their first year at the University of Toronto. Fabiola has also done an internship with Al Otro Lado, an organization that provides services to asylum seekers in the U.S.-Mexico border, where she arranged crossings for unaccompanied minors. Fabiola is currently a Migrant Support Worker with FCJ Refugee Centre, where she supports clients with their immigration applications. Fabiola will complete a Master of Arts in Latin American Studies at Stanford University with a partial scholarship in September 2024.

FREHIWOT GEBREMICHAEL GEBREYESUS

Frehiwot Gebremichael Gebreyesus, from Ethiopia. Born and raised in Addis Ababa, descended from Tigrayan parents. Two years ago, Frehiwot made the difficult decision to migrate to Canada with her three young children to escape the tragic Tigray genocide, as she was one of the victims of the genocide act which was active in Addis Ababa. Her background is rooted in aviation, with over 23 years of dedicated service to Ethiopian Airlines and Saudi Arabian Airlines. Unfortunately, her ethnic identity was a reason to abruptly depart from both her long-standing career and her homeland. This sudden migration had an impact on her social and emotional well-being. Frehiwot's association with CCVT began in January 2022, and she feels the support and training she has received has been truly invaluable.




CCVT VOLUNTEER


